Bauer's Waterpushing Pike Fly

| A second and a sec | Hook size: 4/0 or 5/0 Titanium wire works best for this, but a stiff wire will also work. Tie on the wire, run it through 2-4 beads, loop in a fastach clip and run through beads again. Secure to the hook. A Bauer Pike rig assembly will also work. |
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| | Tie in a small amount of white bucktail taken from the base end of a bucktail. It will need to spread out as much as possible. |
| | Tie in a few strands of flash on top of the hook. The flash should extend past the bucktail a little bit. |
| | Tie in some UV Polar Chenille. (I used the glitter yarn - available if you need it in silver and green). Wrap the chenille about ½ way down the hook. |
| | Reverse tie in a small amount of white bucktail |

| Fold back the hair and create a thread dam in front. The hair should be at about a 45-degree angle from the hook shank. Tie in another bunch of flash and fold back over the bucktail. |
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| Now, different from what we would normally do, we will tie the orange bunch of bucktail with the tips going to the back of the hook and create a bulk-head. Advance the thread to the front of the butt-ends and create a small thread dam. |
| Tie in another bunch of green bucktail exactly like the orange, creating a bulk-head. Make sure there is enough room to glue the disk behind the eye. At least 2-3 millimeters. |
| Push the disk over the eye and glue in place. A UV epoxy pen works well for this purpose. The foam head can be colored with markers if you want. Coat with Sally Hanson or head cement to stiffen the foam. |

The purpose of the bulk-head and foam disk is to push a lot of water without making the fly heavy. I have disks in white and green but can make them in any color.
