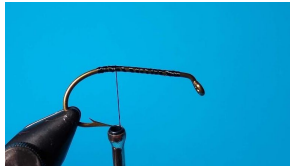


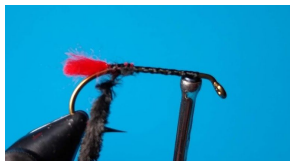
Woolly Worm



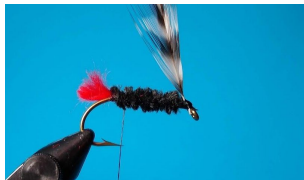
Start your thread behind the eye with a jamb knot and lay a base layer of thread wraps to the bend of the hook (above the barb).



Tie on a small piece of red yarn ($\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{3}{4}$ "). Alternatively, you can use red 4-strand floss. The red tail should only extend beyond the bend of the hook by a little bit.



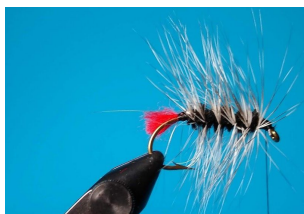
Tie in the chenille at the back of the hook (above the barb of the hook). Wrap forward tightly in touching wraps and secure the chenille behind the eye of the hook.



Tie in a grizzly hackle feather near the eye of the hook, then make open spiral wraps of the thread to the rear of the hook (4-6 wraps) to where the chenille was tied in (above the barb of the hook).



Spiral wrap the hackle feather backward with turns that do not touch and tie off at the back of the hook (above the barb).



Break (or cut) off the unused part of the hackle feather. Carefully wrap the thread forward by wiggling the thread through the feathers to avoid tying them down. Tie off your thread right behind the eye of the hook with a half hitch. This method will hold the feather in place longer as you catch fish!
